The Adirondack region of New York State is well known for a rustic style of architecture, best represented by a series of building complexes known as Great Camps. Much less well known are the thousands of other structures found throughout the region which represent other building types, architectural styles, and historical themes and influences. This talk will explore the Adirondacks' other great architecture—its bridges, dams and power houses, railroad stations, cure cottages, agricultural buildings, the commercial buildings of main streets, inns and hotels, schoolhouses, town and village halls, churches, libraries, industrial buildings, and residences that range from country estates to modest village homes to company built tenements and houses.
